1. Combine the following into one logarithm. **Show all of your work** and write your final answer in the answer box below.

$$5 \log_3(x) - 7 \log_3(x-2) + \frac{1}{3} \log_3(y+1)$$

$$\log_3(x^5) - \log_3((x-2)^7) + \log_3((y+1)^{1/3})$$

$$\log_3\left(\frac{x^5 (y+1)^{1/3}}{(x-2)^7}\right) = \log_3\left(\frac{x^5 \cdot \sqrt[3]{y+1}}{(x-2)^7}\right)$$

Answer:

$$\log_3\left(\frac{x^5 \cdot \sqrt[3]{y+1}}{(x-2)^7}\right)$$

2. Solve the following equation for x . **Show all of your work** and write your answer in the answer box below. You do **not** need to simplify your answer.

$$2 \cdot 7^{x+1} - 5 = 8$$

$$+5 \quad +5$$

$$\frac{2 \cdot 7^{x+1}}{2} = \frac{13}{2}$$

$$\log_7(7^{x+1}) \stackrel{\log_7}{=} \left(\frac{13}{2} \right)$$

$$x+1 = \log_7\left(\frac{13}{2}\right)$$

-1

-1

$$x = \log_7\left(\frac{13}{2}\right) - 1$$

Answer:
